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
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WCHD Organizational Chart

ENVIRONMENTAL HEALTH

The Environmental Health Division works to prevent disease, promote behaviors that improve the health of the community, and protect the environment through enforcement of local and state rules and regulations, as well as by providing consultation regarding environmental health programs and activities. Environmental health specialists conduct routine inspections of licensed establishments, investigate public health nuisance complaints, and provide education on environmental issues affecting Warren County.

Programs conducted by health district staff include, but are not limited to, food safety, public swimming pools, campgrounds, housing, private water systems, household sewage treatment systems, tattoo/body art establishments, school environmental health inspections, and vector control. Several programs conducted by the health district have no associated fees and are made possible through funding from the Warren County Health Levy.

PERMITS AND INSPECTIONS

In 2025, the Environmental Health Division permitted over:

1,200 food service operations and retail food establishments

281 public swimming pools

33 body art facilities

20 campgrounds

WCHD Staff conducted more than **4,000** inspections of these facilities throughout the year.

Staff also conducted over **2,000** household sewage treatment system inspections in 2025, including operation and maintenance inspections as well as new system installation inspections.

Software Transition



In 2025, the Environmental Health Division transitioned away from the HealthSpace inspection and licensing software previously provided to local health districts by the Ohio Department of Health (ODH). The transition to the new Accela platform, selected by ODH to manage environmental health programs statewide, presented operational challenges including data migration issues and workflow adjustments. Once fully implemented, Accela promises to provide an improved interface for health district personnel, facility operators, and the public.

Vector Control Program

The health district continued routine mosquito surveillance activities in 2025, including testing mosquito populations for the presence of West Nile virus and applying larvicides to standing water on public property. The health district was not awarded the Ohio Environmental Protection Agency's Mosquito Control Grant for the 2025 cycle; therefore, no tire recycling events were held. The Warren County Health District has reapplied for 2026 funding.

Household Sewage Treatment System Assistance

Through funding provided by the Ohio Environmental Protection Agency's Water Pollution Control Loan Fund (WPCLF), the health district replaced and/or repaired four failing septic systems in 2025. The health district has been awarded \$150,000 for the 2026 funding cycle. Funding is available based on household income and may cover between 50% and 100% of system repair or replacement costs. Applicants must provide proof of income and property ownership to qualify.

The Ohio Administrative Code requires that all households served by household sewage treatment systems be enrolled in the operation and maintenance program in the health district where the property is located. The Warren County Health District currently has approximately **11,000** sewage treatment systems enrolled. Staff continue to provide education and document system locations. Systems should generally be pumped every three to five years depending on usage.

VITAL STATISTICS

Beginning in October 2025, certified death records for individuals born in Ohio became available at any local health district in the state. Previously, death certificates could only be obtained from the county in which the death occurred. This change has improved access for the public, and the number of death certificates issued by the Warren County Health District has increased since implementation.

In 2025, WCHD's Vital Statistics Office recorded:

as having occurred in Warren County.

Births and deaths are recorded in the county in which they occur, regardless of residence.



Plumbing Inspection

The Plumbing Division of the Warren County Health District is responsible for ensuring proper installation of plumbing throughout all of Warren County in accordance with Chapter 4101:2-56-69 of the Ohio Administrative Code, also known as the Ohio Plumbing Code, and local regulations.

The inspectors conduct inspections for bathroom and kitchen remodeling (when fixtures are added or moved), water heater replacement, water softeners, new single and multi-family residential, and all commercial plumbing installations. They also review plumbing plans for compliance with the Ohio Plumbing Code, and if approved, issue permits. This department also performs inspections of water line installations from the meter pit into the house or building within the City of Mason.

In 2025, there were:

414 plumbing contractors registered with WCHD to do plumbing work in the county

3,039 permits were issued

5,696 inspections/consultations took place to assist contractors and homeowners with plumbing code issues

The Plumbing Division also administers an isolation water backflow prevention program. This involves making sure building owners have their required backflow prevention device tested annually (as required by the Ohio Plumbing Code) to assure it is working properly to protect the drinking water within a structure



Emergency Preparedness & Response, Harm Reduction, and Accreditation



Emergency Preparedness and Response

Through the Public Health Emergency Preparedness (PHEP) and Cities Readiness Initiative (CRI) programs, WCHD strengthened regional coordination, exercised emergency response capabilities, and advanced medical countermeasure readiness in 2025. Staff participated in full-scale exercises, regional chemical response planning, and multi-state preparedness leadership efforts to ensure readiness for complex public health emergencies.



Emergency Preparedness & Response, Harm Reduction, and Accreditation



Harm Reduction

In 2025, Warren County Health District expanded community-based harm reduction efforts by strengthening training partnerships and securing external funding to support overdose prevention initiatives. These efforts reflect WCHD's continued commitment to preventing overdose deaths and improving community awareness.

554 Naloxone Boxes Distributed

Accreditation:

In 2025, Warren County Health District entered Year Two of the 2023–2026 Community Health Improvement Plan (CHIP), advancing nine cross-sector strategies across priority areas including Access to Care, Health Behaviors, and Mental Health & Addiction. Seven of nine CHIP strategies met or exceeded their 2025 performance targets, reflecting strong partner engagement and measurable progress toward improving health outcomes in Warren County. The agency will apply for national reaccreditation through the Public Health Accreditation Board (PHAB) in 2026.

In 2025, the PIO continued to advance WCHD's mission through a variety of strategic initiatives and community engagement efforts. The PIO participated in a full-scale emergency preparedness exercise to strengthen response readiness and interagency coordination. The PIO also attended networking events and educational seminars featuring agencies from across the tri-state region, building partnerships and staying informed on regional public health priorities. In addition, the PIO pursued continuing education to further enhance professional skills and knowledge.

Throughout the year, the PIO focused on sharing WCHD's story with Warren County residents through social media, outreach events, the WCHD newsletter, updated and newly developed promotional materials, and interviews with local news agencies. The PIO also supported outreach efforts to promote the Southwest Ohio Data Hub and continued contributing to the ongoing implementation of the Community Health Improvement Plan.

Reaccreditation work continues into 2025, with the Accreditation team continuing to meet and further WCHD's path to reaccreditation in October of this year. We were able to attend multiple trainings with the Ohio Accreditation Learning Community to learn more about the reaccreditation process.

CLINICAL SERVICES- NURSING DIVISION

Warren County Health District's clinical services continue to change and expand along with the growing changes in our community. In addition to the below clinics/programs, the Warren County Health District offers nutritional counseling, breast feeding consultations, social services, and blood pressure checks to all clinic clients and residents of Warren County. The health district also provides Spanish and Uzbek interpretation services for clients, if necessary, as well as the use of a language service for most languages. Also available is an Insurance Navigator for education and assistance with applying for Marketplace Insurance, as well as Medicaid.

Prenatal Clinic

The Prenatal Clinic offers total obstetrical care for clients with delivery at Bethesda North Hospital of TriHealth. The staff consists of OB/GYN physicians (from Bethesda North), registered nurses, a licensed dietitian, case worker, a Spanish interpreter, an Uzbek interpreter, and a secretary. Early and consistent prenatal care is encouraged to help ensure the health and wellbeing of both mother and baby. The prenatal staff screens each client for specific social and economic concerns, as well as counseling on daily health, nutrition, and smoking cessation. Caseworkers assist clients in applying for Medicaid, health education, behavioral health screen and referral.

Family Health Clinic

The Family Health Clinic consists of the Adult Health and Child Health clinics. Family Health Clinic exists to ensure affordable, culturally appropriate, high-quality health and wellness services. A staff of physicians, nurse practitioners, nurses, a Spanish interpreter, an Uzbek interpreter, a dietitian, and case workers provide quality care to infants and children birth to 21 years of age living in Warren County and surrounding counties. The clinic is also available to adults age 21 years of age and over living in Warren County.

Services provided for infants, children and adults include acute care visits, maintenance visits (hypertension, diabetes and other chronic diseases), physical exams (routine physicals, well child checkups, sports physicals, work physicals, pre-operative and Head Start physicals), immunizations, hemoglobin testing, urinalysis, Tuberculosis skin testing, developmental screening, lead testing and counselling, referrals to appropriate agencies (if ordered by the provider), Prevent Blindness program for assistance receiving free eye exams and eye glasses, car seat program and medication assistance program.

The Family Health clinic provides health care and referral services to uninsured clients, and clients with Medicaid. Most insurances are accepted. Medicare insurance is not accepted. The case worker helps clients apply for Medicaid or Marketplace insurance as needed.

Prevent Blindness Clinic

The Prevent Blindness Clinic provides free vision exams at local Optometrists for low-income residents. The exams are provided through state funding.

Travel Clinic

The Overseas Travel Clinic provides immunizations and education necessary to travel safely to/from other countries.

Reproductive Health & Wellness Clinic

The Reproductive Health & Wellness Clinic provides complete gynecologic physical exams for both clients desiring contraception and women's health needs. This clinic provides reliable methods of contraception to enable women to plan their pregnancies and provides pregnancy testing. Reproductive Health services are also provided to males in this clinic. The staff consists of a physician, registered nurses, a secretary, a caseworker, a Spanish interpreter, an Uzbek interpreter, and a licensed dietitian.

The clinic coordinator has implemented preconception education and counseling programs for prepubescent and pubescent children for many schools and other public organizations. This clinic is a provider for the Ohio Department of Health Breast and Cervical Cancer Screening Project (BCCP). Also available in this clinic is Sexually Transmitted Disease services. Confidential STD testing and treatment is offered to men and women, as well as HIV/AIDS testing and education.

Tuberculosis Clinic

The main goal of the TB Chest Clinic is to eradicate tuberculosis in Warren County through early diagnosis and treatment. Mantoux skin testing, Quantiferon TB Gold blood test and chest x-rays, when required, are available at a minimal charge to Warren County residents. Treatment for tuberculosis and preventive therapy are also offered by WCHD. In the event of an active case of TB in Warren County, WCHD staff provides Direct Observed Therapy (DOT).

Complex Medical Help

The CMH (Complex Medical Help) program of WCHD provides case management and service coordination for Warren County families with children under the age of 21 years who have or potentially have special health care needs. The health district has one CMH nurse.

WCHD Mobile Health

IMMUNIZATION PROGRAM

The immunization program continues to be an important focus of the Warren County Health District. Timely immunization of our children can help lead to the decline of communicable illnesses such as measles, mumps, rubella, diphtheria, polio, tetanus, pertussis, haemophilus influenza, hepatitis B, hepatitis A, meningitis, rotavirus, etc. Every year the health department experiences many changes that occur within the immunization schedules. New immunizations and new combinations of immunizations are added, while other immunizations are deleted. To meet the immunization needs of the county, we offer appointments for childhood and adult immunizations throughout the week, Monday through Friday.

In addition to the many flu vaccination clinics provided at the Warren County Health District, the nursing staff traveled to various Warren County businesses to provide flu vaccinations to as many residents as possible. This year, the health department began giving the flu vaccinations in September.

The Overseas Travel Immunization Program was added in 1999. This program has grown tremendously and continues to provide immunizations to Warren County residents who are traveling out of the United States. This service is also available to people who are not residents of Warren County, at an added cost. Warren County Health District also offers public health vaccines such as hepatitis A/B, pre-exposure, and post rabies, pneumococcal, meningococcal, varicella, shingles, and Covid vaccinations.

WOMEN, INFANTS, AND CHILDREN (WIC)

The Special Supplemental Nutrition Program for Women, Infants and Children is intended to reach income-eligible pregnant, postpartum and breastfeeding women, infants and children up to five years of age with a health or nutrition risk. WIC services are set up to address WIC's most important goal: prevention of nutrition-related health problems.

WIC Provides Four Key Services:



Nutrition education and supplemental foods supplying key nutrients



Health screenings and assessments



Breastfeeding education and support



Referral to prenatal and pediatric health care and other maternal and child health care and human service programs

All of these services help to improve overall health during the most critical growth and developmental years in a child's life – conception to age five. By preventing health problems early in life, WIC helps save health care dollars later.

The WIC program celebrated its 51st birthday on January 15th, 2025. Warren County has been on the retail system for twenty-five years now. Local WIC projects continue to issue the newer food packages that began in October 2009. The newer food packages added fruits, vegetables, whole grains and lower fat milk for adults and children two years of age and older. Recently, The United States Department of Agriculture has reviewed the food packages, to include cheese and yogurt.

The current WIC food packages for women and children consist of milk, juice, cereal, peanut butter, dried or canned beans, whole grains, fruits and vegetables. The WIC food packages for applicable infants consist of infant formula, infant cereal and baby food fruits and vegetables. WIC participants continue to use a WIC Electronic Benefits Transfer (EBT) nutrition card. The WIC EBT nutrition card is loaded with their food packages and is able to be scanned at any Ohio WIC vendor. In addition, our Breastfeeding Peer Helper Program (initiated in October 2010) continues to offer breastfeeding support and education.


